

JCC–Nampa Facility PREA Report

In 2014 JCC–Nampa housed 207 juveniles. During this period there were 34 reports received:

- 7 substantiated incidents
- 4 unsubstantiated incidents
- 6 unfounded incidents
- 15 Incidents reported which were not PREA (investigated & ruled out)
- 2 Incidents reported which were determined to constitute non-abusive contact

In 2015 JCC–Nampa housed 174 juveniles. During this period there were 43 reports received:

- 4 substantiated incidents
- 3 unsubstantiated incidents
- 4 unfounded incidents
- 24 Incidents reported which were not PREA (investigated & ruled out)
- 8 Incidents reported which were determined to constitute non-abusive contact

Of the 4 substantiated incidents in 2015, listed below is the nature of the incident:

- A juvenile reported being harassed by another juvenile who made inappropriate advances.
- Multiple juveniles reported that another juvenile had exposed himself and made repeated sexually inappropriate comments.
- A juvenile reported that another juvenile made repeated sexually inappropriate comments to him.
- 2 juvenile’s reported that while on transport together one of them made inappropriate intentional contact with the other.

After reviewing the facts associated with the substantiated incidents it was possible to determine that 3 of the 4 incidents involve sexual harassment. The substantiated incident of sexual abuse was brief (less than 5 seconds), covert, and committed without threats of force or coercion. The area in which they occurred did not include architectural blind spots. JCC-Nampa completed a Juvenile Facility PREA compliance audit and is 100% compliant.

Corrective action plans occur following every substantiated incident and some unsubstantiated incidents where measures can be taken that can improve safety. Typical corrective action plans include:

- Additional training on supervision practices, or a change in supervision practices, to include increased supervision efforts
 - Identification of barriers to adequate supervision and strategies to mitigate
 - Safety Contracts for the juveniles
 - Sanctions for juveniles identified to have engaged in sexual misconduct
 - If appropriate, contact with HR and/or law enforcement
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
