

Online Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs (ATOD) Education Classes IDJC Millennium Grant Program

The Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections, in partnership with the Idaho Juvenile Justice Commission, announces the availability of funds to support web-based education classes for juvenile status or low-risk offenders on tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs. The department is contracting with 3rd Millennium Classrooms to provide this service.

Counties and Tribes may access this program by submitting an application and substance abuse questionnaire for individual youth who meet program guidelines listed below.

This program is designed to enhance ATOD education provided through counties and Tribes and is not intended to supplant existing programs or funding intended for this purpose. If counties or Tribes already have a budget line item or grant for web-based ATOD classes, these funds may be used once the existing resources are exhausted.

Administrative Procedures and Guidelines

Eligibility

- The online ATOD classes are available to juvenile status or low-risk offenders, ages 10-17.
- The juvenile must be observed committing, or charged with, a citable offense by a law enforcement or probation / diversion officer. Juveniles do not need to be formally charged to be eligible.
- Counties/Tribes shall screen and identify appropriate participants, ensuring the juveniles do not qualify for substance use treatment through the IDJC SUDS Program.

Application

- Applications must come to IDJC from county or Tribal diversion or probation offices.

Process

- County/Tribe submits application and substance abuse questionnaire to IDJC.
 - Law enforcement officers may refer juveniles to this program by completing an application and substance abuse questionnaire and then submitting the documentation to county or Tribal diversion or probation offices.
- IDJC reviews and approves and notifies applicant.
- The county or Tribe provides the applicant with a user identification code.
- Applicant advises juvenile on access to classes and oversees class completion.
- IDJC will pay 3rd Millennium Classrooms directly.
